The moving insight and the power of the words of a hymn, the music of which you enjoy?

The renewal of mind and body after a night of restful sleep?

The way the cut in your finger healed, leaving scarcely a trace of the opening?

The spontaneous response which overcomes you when you are face to face with some poignant human need?

The times when deep within your heart you whisper a thank-you to Life, to God, or, as you may say, to the Fates! I seek new levels of awareness of the meaning of the commonplace.

Members of the inaugural Reparations Fund Committee have been appointed by Bishop Alan Gates and confirmed by the Diocesan Council at its meeting on Sept. 14. The committee's role will be to carry out the convention's stated mission for the fund, "to help repair the breach of systemic racism in the life of our diocese, region and nation, by resourcing Black communities to flourish in myriad ways." The committee will discern, oversee, direct and report on all reparations payments, disbursements and investments. Fr. Al has been appointed to this committee.

The Healthy Congregations Task Force—formed in response to the 2023 Diocesan Convention resolution calling for such—has partnered with Holy Cow! Consulting to launch a "Landscape Assessment" to "provide valuable information concerning how we are living into our mission and vision as a diocesan community, where we shine, where we'd like to focus our energy and where we can, in collective ministry, find new ways to lift each other up." The task force asks everyone—clergy and lay people to fill out the assessment which is available in English and Spanish. The assessment will take about 15 minutes to complete and must be done at one time. Confidentiality is central to this work; all responses are anonymous and go directly to Holy Cow! Consulting.
